NOTE FROM THE DESK OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & PRINCIPAL

It has been a full and rewarding fall here at MBCI due, in part, to our Homecoming celebration in September. Part of our recognition of this milestone is a Legacy Wall installation in the link walkway. With photos and captions that highlight important benchmarks in our story, this wall helps us to visualize our journey over the decades.

This installation, along with our Homecoming preparations, have provided space for me to reflect upon those factors that help an organization and a community like MBCI to survive through generations and also to flourish.

MBCI began in 1945 with a vision – shared by families and the church - for providing rigorous education that would open doors for students while passing on the treasures of faith and heritage. This vision only became a reality, however, when embodied through hard work, sacrifice, and deeply-held conviction.

We know today, just as our community understood 80 years ago, that core values fall short unless we have the foundational and understood behaviours to go along with them. Our vision and mission today – for equipping students to learn, love, and engage with the world, within an environment grounded in meaning, purpose and belonging – will fall short unless we nurture the kind of student and school culture we need to translate our vision into reality.

And just as MBCI's founders wanted to create a school with a difference, we continue to embrace the privilege and responsibility of shaping a learning environment that reaches beyond teaching and includes nurturing "the light" in our students.

The context within which we teach and learn in 2025 is shifting and changing in remarkable ways. While this can feel daunting at times, we believe in the ability of education and faith to shape our students in ways that equip them to move on from here to shape and serve the world.

We believe that the world needs young people who are prepared with the skillset required to solve problems, and also the character and habits they will need to serve and care for others.

We need young people who can think critically while also being able to sit at the same table with those who are different than us - to be respectful and even curious to listen. We need young people who can pursue individual goals while remembering their responsibility to others. In short, we continue to need vision and core values, embodied through character, practices, and behaviours.

At MBCI we're working toward this goal by focusing on the kind of student culture that we nurture here. This is our training ground for learning how to engage with the world.

Our learning culture is built on a growth mindset, embracing a willingness to try, and try again, knowing that through practice, creativity and collaboration we can improve and become better problem solvers. We nurture curiosity and innovation in our students and a sense of ownership over their learning.

Our community culture is focused on the privilege and responsibility of taking care of one another; understanding and treating each other as beloved children of God. This doesn't happen by accident, but through the relational and conflict transformation practices we choose every day with our students, and by designing culture-building activities to foster a sense of belonging.

Our faith culture is built upon the life and teachings of Jesus Christ, using that as our example for serving others with compassion. We know that as staff we need to model the behaviours for which we want to plant seeds in our students. And we provide the chance to practice Christ-like compassion through service learning.

Our Legacy Wall in the walkway does not have a conclusion. We have an entire wall facing it on which to continue the story some day! We are dedicated to a flourishing MBCI that serves our students, families and our world into future generations, guided by a clear vision and a steadfast commitment to embodying this vision through behaviour and action.


WHAT'S NEW AT MBCI?

Legacy Wall

Over the past decade we have been working to ensure that our spaces on campus visually reflect our vision and mission as a



way of keeping within our sights the framework within which we learn and the school culture we have chosen to nurture. Our most recent installation is a Legacy Wall, completed just in time for our 80th Anniversary Homecoming Celebration. Located in the link hallway between our two buildings, the gallery provides a timeline of some of the moments that have defined this school community and continue to guide its journey today – noting shifts in leadership, policy, program development, and



Student Leadership in Chapel

We are a couple of years into a practice of having every grade take a turn each year in planning and leading an all-school chapel. Students take a variety of approaches to this opportunity, drawing on our theme verse for the year or from their learning in Bible class for content inspiration, and determine as a group how they want to engage their fellow students. The resulting chapels have included short films, skits, readings, service projects, inspiring and energetic singing, and we're grateful for the chance to experience student leadership in our learning and worship.



Outdoor Ed

We have expanded our course offerings in 2025-2026 to include an Outdoor Education option for Grades 8 and 9. Until now we have had co-curricular opportunities like canoe trips as well as field learning trips to

Fort Whyte Alive and other outdoor locations that have served to deepen our students' appreciation for creation and the importance of caring



for the environment. This new course takes place primarily outdoors and helps students develop the knowledge, skills, and attitudes needed for a safe and comfortable experience in all seasons. We incorporate biblical teachings regarding care for creation and how to be good stewards of the land, while also considering indigenous perspectives and land-based learning.

Junior Musical

While MBCI has a long tradition of producing an all-school musical every second year, we have recently introduced a junior musical production in the years between.



For our first junior musical in 2024, we presented *Into the Woods Jr.* exclusively featuring the hard work and talent of our middle school students. Although the scope of production is scaled back from our biennial all-school musical, this new undertaking provides our younger students with a focused opportunity to explore and develop their gifts. We are excited for February 25 – 28, 2026, when our middle school students will present *Moana Jr.*! They have been hard at work since September and we can't wait to experience the rewards of their dedication. Watch MBCI social media for information about the show and how to purchase tickets.

Increased Enrollment

MBCI has experienced four years of significant increase in enrollment. Up from 540 students last year, our student population for 2025 - 2026 is 593. We continue to accompany this increase with added staff to our Student Support Team. We are pleased to welcome a Social Worker to our team to help provide the level of care required by a large student body and to support a positive student culture.

FOCUS ON PROJECT BASED LEARNING

MBCI incorporates a Project Based Learning (PBL) approach across grades and in every subject area. Projects are a student-centered, inquiry-based approach to curriculum engagement through which students apply their own curiosity and hands-on problem-solving skills to real-world questions. Learning this way helps students grow in their ability to communicate, collaborate, and think creatively and critically.

Serving Others with Our Learning

An important focus of PBL is looking at how we can incorporate service into our learning. When students serve others in some way as they are applying their own curiosity to real-world questions, it helps them practice their ability to look beyond themselves and connects their learning to the development of character and faith. Examples of how service is woven into a project include:

- Our Grade 9 Bible students engaged in a project where they learned from a local pastor who ministers in a church community that serves and supports individuals in Winnipeg who are experiencing homelessness. Students used their research to develop a non-profit concept to help those who are suffering with the aim of extending God's Shalom.
- When our Grade 10 Science students learn about Newton's Laws of Motion, they use these concepts to design games that demonstrate Newton's Laws, and invite our Grade 5 students to test out their prototypes while learning at the

same time. This approach builds relationships across grades and helps make learning more personal, solidifying scientific concepts in the minds of both presenters as well as the audience they're serving.



Grade 9 Social Studies

Last year our Grade 9 students engaged in a Social Studies project focused on Truth & Reconciliation in which they were challenged to come up with ways that demonstrate commitment to reconciliation in our everyday lives. Students engaged in research and listened to Indigenous



perspectives before proposing their own solutions for how to apply their knowledge. One group designed an activity of creating keychains with beads as a way of celebrating the resilience of Indigenous cultures.

When MBCI recognized National Day for Truth & Reconciliation in September, this activity became part of the learning and reflection for our whole student body. Our keychains have seven beads, representing the seven generations who experienced residential school. Seven-generational thinking is also an Indigenous concept of thinking ahead about how our actions today will affect future generations. Each key chain was first threaded with an orange bead for Orange Shirt Day and the importance of righting the wrongs of the past. Students chose their next beads by colour to represent various parts of their own identities, while reflecting on what it would feel like to have their identities forcibly taken away.

Our students continue to carry these keychains on their backpacks, binders and water bottles, serving as an everyday reminder of the work still required of each one of us toward Truth & Reconciliation.

HOMECOMING REVIEW







This September marks 80 years since 44 Grade 10 and 11 students, one teacher, and a part time Principal, gathered in two rented classrooms to begin a journey of Christ-centered education within an Anabaptist and Mennonite Brethren context.

On September 27 we welcomed almost 600 guests to MBCI Homecoming in celebration of this journey! The day was a powerful reminder that MBCI's story is about so much

more than any one moment or memory in the history of our school. Our story is cumulative and ongoing; a community shaped by its past, engaged with its present, and committed to embracing the future.

The day was designed for connection, with activities chosen to appeal to guests of all ages and interests, while revisiting some favourite MBCI traditions.

We began the day in Jubilee Place for our opening program, with a chance to hear from our Executive Director and Principal Andrea Buller about how we live out the vision and mission of MBCI today. The program updated guests on the exciting Red Gym project currently underway and our plans for investing in this space to prepare it for future generations.



It was a privilege to open the day by recognizing three MBCI Distinguished Alumni. With **Patricia Kumbakisaka** and **Dr. Jerry M. Maniate** able to join us in person, while **Dr. Henry G. Friesen's** award was given posthumously, we were honoured to reflect upon the example these individuals provide of lives invested in service to God and others, while engaged in ground-breaking medical research, diplomacy, and the work of addressing inequities in healthcare.

As we moved through the middle part of the day, which turned out to be gloriously sunny and warm, guests enjoyed a complimentary lunch and snacks from a variety of food trucks, while taking in the petting zoo and family carnival in the greenspace. Indoors, our spaces were buzzing with conversation and catching up: the Red Gym produced much excitement for both current students and alumni with the basketball skills competition and volleyball tournament; guests got a taste of what daily school life looks like in the library by doing some crafting with MakerSpace; we had a chance to walk down memory lane in the newly unveiled Legacy Walkway and by looking through memorabilia and old yearbooks; and guided campus tours highlighted how MBCI is designed for collaboration and engagement while guests also revisited some familiar corners and spaces.

The day finished off in Jubilee Place with the extended stage filled by musicians of all ages. The massed choir and band demonstrated that the passing of years has not dimmed the talent of our alumni nor our enjoyment in creating beautiful music together.

MBCI Red Gym Renovation Plan

The **Red Gym Refresh Project** is a comprehensive renovation designed to transform this beloved space into a modern, 21st-century athletic facility. Scheduled to begin March 30, 2026, with completion by Fall 2026, the project ensures that MBCI students, athletic teams, and community groups can continue to thrive for decades to come.



- State-of-the-art gym floor featuring bio-cushion upgrades for safety and performance.
- **Modernized change rooms** for physical education, athletic teams, and community rentals.
- **Refreshed bleachers** with the current seating repurposed to upgrade the Blue Gym.

- A welcoming new vestibule entrance designed with accessibility in mind.
- Lower-level athletics hub with dedicated Hawks home team lockers, jersey storage, laundry, and ice facilities.
- A refreshed exterior with new siding and insulation creating a bright and inviting face for the MBCI community.
